

Fast Facts About Laundered Towels

Because it is common practice that foodservice towels are laundered with towels from other industries, **they can become contaminated with heavy metals and other dangerous residues during the laundering process.**

13 MILLION

number of pounds of hazardous contaminants discharged into public water systems annually from industrial laundries

A **2011 Gradient Study** found:

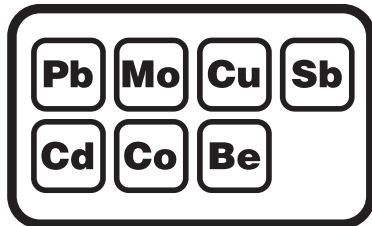


100%

of laundered towels tested contain toxic heavy metals

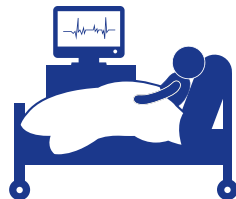
Workers using laundered towels daily **may be exposed to excessive levels of:**

- Lead
- Cadmium
- Molybdenum
- Cobalt
- Copper
- Beryllium
- Antimony



Prolonged exposure to heavy metals is associated with:

- Nervous system damage
- Reproductive problems
- Cancer
- Skin disease
- Kidney disease



Towels can get used in **UNINTENDED WAYS:**



55%

of workers use laundered towels on bare skin three or more times a day

36%

take laundered towels home



54%

say co-workers take laundered towels home

18%

use them for personal hygiene and first aid



When workers are **presented with the risks** posed by laundered towels:



78%

of workers believe laundered towels should be banned if not **100%** free of hazardous materials after laundering



86%

would raise the issue with a manager



93%

would take greater safety precautions



71%

believe employers have a duty to keep workers informed about safety issues related to laundered towels



87%

would ask for safer alternative
